LA FERME: An Immersive and Engaged Experience on Artificial Intelligence

Tiohtià:ke/Montréal, April 8, 2025 – ATSA, When Art Takes Action, presents LA FERME, an engaged installation-performance addressing the issues of artificial intelligence and its impact on our lives. Taking place at Esplanade Tranquille in the Quartier des spectacles from May 23 to 25, 2025, this participatory experience invites the public to question the omnipresence of AI through a striking performance led by actress Geneviève Rochette, embodying the avatar of Annie Roy, who writes and directs the piece. In addition to the performance, a series of workshop-debates hosted by industry experts will be held in Le Réfectoire of the Esplanade Tranquille.

A Black Cube to Illuminate Our Awareness

LA FERME stems from a vital question: Why is such technology becoming so pervasive at a time when we should be reducing our ecological footprint? Are the impacts on our cultural and territorial sovereignty worth the trade-off? The acceleration of these transformations, their geopolitical and environmental consequences, raise concerns, especially as we have little control over their evolution. Are we programming our own obsolescence? LA FERME pushes us to take a stand in reality and rediscover our wonder for life itself, all through a resolutely Quebecois perspective.

This impactful installation, conceived and directed by Annie Roy in collaboration with Raymond Marius Boucher, takes the form of a monumental 12'x12' black cube—a metaphor for Al's black box and the data farms powering its algorithms. Combining video projections, stage performances, and interactive discussions, LA FERME invites us to place humans back at the center of the technological conversation.

This project, spearheaded by ATSA, When Art Takes Action, serves as a sort of artistic logbook. Without being an AI expert, Annie Roy explores this imposed reality with curiosity and humility. The evolving work will take the form of an immersive audiovisual installation in a public space. Through testimonies from experts such as Dave Anctil, Matthieu Dugal, Steven Guilbeault, Valentine Goddard, and Michal Seta, Annie Roy guides us through a critical exploration of AI and its implications.

"I belong to the generation of rotary phones and rabbit-ear antenna televisions. The speed of evolution—one that even scientists struggle to control—within a capitalist system constantly seeking to maximize profit is alarming. We need to physically feel what all of this means. LA FERME is a theatrical installation in a public space, meant to make us experience emotions, foster connections, and spark discussion among real humans who are starting to feel overwhelmed by the machine."
